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OUR VISION

We believe everyone has the ability to write stories and we believe everyone should be able to share those stories. We want to:

- Give opportunity to those who haven't had access to traditional writing and publishing avenues
- Empower young writers with lower literacy levels with the confidence to find their voices
- Position new young writers as leading lights to others in their communities
- Develop and celebrate unique stories by storytellers from diverse backgrounds across the state
- Celebrate emerging writers through the publication of their stories
- Be innovators in new storytelling forms and gain national and international recognition for our work in publishing flash and micro fiction
- Give opportunity to emerging publishing practitioners including designers, typesetters, illustrators
- Mentor emerging editors.

To achieve this vision, we will:

- Seek out grants and funding opportunities for projects
- Hold flash and micro writing workshops at schools and in community centres
- Mentor new writers, through development and editing
- Publish flash and micro anthologies of emerging youth writers
- Publish anthologies of adult emerging writers alongside experienced writers writing in new forms
- Collaborate with emerging industry professionals
- Provide editorial internships
- Appear at literary festivals and events
- Judge writing competitions

FROM THE CHAIR

On behalf of the board of Night Parrot Press, I am delighted to present the 2022 annual report.

The global pandemic has made it increasingly difficult for writers to achieve publication, hold events and promote their work. West Australian writers, who often get overlooked in the national reviewing culture and at interstate writers' festivals, continue to be more disadvantaged. It is in this at times dispiriting context that I wish to celebrate the vision and work of Night Parrot Press.

Three years ago, Laura Keenan and Linda Martin, both highly experienced editors and passionate readers, challenged themselves to create a publishing house devoted to Western Australians writing in the shorter narrative form. They were, and remain, excited by the prospect of promoting local writers and building on the growing popularity of flash and micro fiction. This year, Night Parrot Press, has seen the production of two well-received books: a second anthology of flash fiction, Twice Not Shy: One hundred short short stories, and Ros Thomas's How to Shame the Devil. Laura and Linda have been closely involved with the production and promotion of these books: the selection of submissions; editing; mentoring editors; organising book launches and author events; securing invitations to writer's festivals; and creating relationships with Perth's independent bookshops. This tireless and enthusiastic work, completed mostly on an unpaid basis, means that Night Parrot Press has already and rightly earned the respect of the writing and reading community in WA.

I also wish to pay tribute to the encouragement by Night Parrot Press of emerging writers and editors. Such work has contributed to the creation of an ongoing, vibrant writing culture. Workshops have also created great interest in the pleasures and challenges of writing flash fiction.

The success of Night Parrot Press in the 2021-2022 financial year

has also been financial. The Press received funding from the West Australian Department of Local Government, Cultural Industries and Sport, book sales, and ticketing sales from writing workshops and author events. The next step is to secure more and sustained funding; to this end, the board will establish a sub-committee focused on obtaining financial support from a range of sources. This work will be crucial. While long-term funding would be ideal, all avenues for funding must be vigorously and rigorously pursued.

While publication and sales are tangible measures of the success of a publishing house, a far less tangible but equally important sign is the satisfaction of both writers and readers. Launches, word-of-mouth and author events have made evident the joy and pride for writers that comes with publication, and the pleasure that readers take in the provocations, pathos and humour of the shorter narrative form. Such community enthusiasm is result of the hard work and energy of Laura and Linda. They have created something unique and valuable in the West Australian writing community.

FROM THE CEOs

The past year has been incredibly busy and rewarding for Night Parrot Press. We published a second anthology of flash fiction by Western Australian writers, both emerging and established, and took a risk with publishing our first novella, How to Shame the Devil, by Ros Thomas. Both publications proved their profitability, going to reprint within the first four months of release. We continued to run flash fiction workshops in schools and community centres, judged flash writing competitions, and received our first invitation as panelists to the Perth Festival Writers Weekend. As book sales and social media followers indicate, our brand recognition is growing by leaps and bounds within WA and beyond.

In the 2021-22 financial year, we secured funding from the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries (DLGSC) for two publications (Miniatures and Three Can Keep a Secret), scheduled for release in the 2022-23 financial year. This funding enabled us to pay authors and professionals and we are extremely grateful for the support of DLGSC. Going forward, we endeavour to generate more income for Night Parrot Press. While we have been able to pay for some administration fees, most of our publishing work has been on a volunteer basis. We have come to realise that if the Press is to be sustainable, it must be able to pay its publishers and have ongoing administrative support.

Looking forward, we hope to continue Night Parrot Press's growth as a respected and innovative publisher of short-form fiction. We will continue our focus on providing publishing platforms for new and emerging writers, established authors writing in new forms, mentoring youth writers, and offering opportunities for emerging editors, designers and illustrators. We believe the spirit of stewardship and cultivating new talent is a valuable investment in creating a vibrant and sustainable arts community.

Numerous writers, board members and supporters helped us to make the year a success, and we can't thank this amazing community enough for their belief, encouragement, creativity and time. We look forward to learning, growing and celebrating future success with this generous community.



Twice Not Shy: One hundred short short stories


Twice Not Shy by various authors was launched in April 2021 (postponed due to a Covid lockdown) at the Mount Lawley Bowling Club. Over 150 authors, friends and family attended the launch. With food, wine and readings by Gillian O'Shaughnessy, Priya Khalon, Sabrina Dudgeon-Swift (reading for Daniel Pitt), and Susan Midalia, the evening was very successful. Our first print run of 500 copies almost sold out under two months and we reprinted 350 copies in July 2021.



How to Shame the Devil by Ros Thomas was launched in November 2022 at the Cottesloe Surf Lifesaving Club. The book was launched by Sir Nicholas Hasluck with introduction by Laura Keenan and a very engaging speech by Ros Thomas. Over 190 people enjoyed food, wine and good company. Our first print run of 2000 copies was selling so fast that we reprinted another 1000 copies in March 2022. How to Shame the Devil continues to sell with bookclubs and has received interest from a film production company. We are delighted to have Ros Thomas as an author and thank her for all she has done in promoting her work and Night Parrot Press.

EDITING AND PUBLISHING MENTORSHIPS

Night Parrot Press believes it is important to provide the next generation of editors and publishing personnel with editing and publishing skills in order to establish a career in publishing. In 2022, Night Parrot Press welcomed three talented professionals to the team.

Casey Mulder, a recipient of the Magabala Creative Development Scholarship, undertook an editing mentorship with Night Parrot Press over 2022. The mentorship allowed Casey to observe the publishing processes at Night Parrot Press. Within this, Casey also co-edited Miniatures by Susan Midalia (published July 2022) and provided cultural advice and editing on stories in Three Can Keep a Secret (published October 2022). Night Parrot Press is very grateful to Casey for the valuable editing and publishing contributions she made to the Press, and is honoured to have been shared relevant Indigenous cultural knowledge.

Since completing the Creative Development
Scholarship, I have been given several paid editing and proofreading opportunities with HarperCollins, and have joined a network called First Nations and People of Colour in Publishing. I have also taken on the role of First Nations Editor at Westerly Magazine and have also received a Writing Fellowship at the Centre for Stories in Perth, where I am working on a memoir manuscript over the next year. This Scholarship has opened the door to many other opportunities, and I am very grateful for the support of Magabala. (Casey Mulder)

Night Parrot Press was also able to secure funding for both publications which enabled Mali to be financially rewarded for her wonderful design work.


